Led by O.F.A.H. member Glen Pomeroy, this hands-on, four-credit outdoor skills development program gives young people the training they need to succeed as they pursue resource management careers. Recently, students in this class joined Get Outdoors, the flagship youth conservation initiative of O.F.A.H.
